Michael Gene Sullivan's stage adaptation of the cautionary tale is especially relevant as people across the world grapple with issues like freedom of speech, the nature of truth, political power, privacy, and the dangers of being constantly plugged in. *Contains mature themes.*



The epic tale of one man's struggle to return home remains one of the most treasured pieces of world literature. Well suited to Aquila's signature style of theatrical storytelling, the classic leaps to the stage as an action-packed sequel to Homer's *The Iliad*. After leading the Greeks in a crushing victory over Troy, Odysseus turns his ships toward Ithaca, not imagining that his journey will be as long and treacherous as the 10-year war. This new adaptation captures his encounters with a fantastical array of mythical creatures, monsters, and divine forces, as Odysseus uses his strength, skill, and intellect to persevere and rejoin his family.

On December 1, 1955 in Montgomery, Alabama, a determined activist named Rosa Parks was arrested when she refused to give up her seat for a white person on a city bus. Her courageous action launched the year-long boycott of public transit which served as a catalyst to galvanize the Civil Rights movement. Weaving together original music and drama, the inspirational play traces her story from childhood to the day she decided to "sit down and be counted." Dispelling myths about Rosa Parks and her protest, the musical portrays a complex woman who trained in civil disobedience and became a respected advocate for equal rights.



Commissioned by the League of Women Voters of Nashville, *72 Steps* takes an empowering look at the struggle to pass the 19th Amendment while highlighting Tennessee's vital role in granting women the right to vote. Depicting a fight that spanned over 72 years, choreographer Gina Patterson draws parallels between past and present. Through the lens of the suffrage movement, she explores basic human rights, civic responsibility, and the continuing battle for a more equitable society. The language of ballet brings an evocative physical symbolism to this story of persistence and protest. Dancers grapple with barriers and move in and out of costume elements that illuminate the era's male and female perspectives. A companion piece, *New Beginnings*, by choreographer Christopher Stuart, explores the strength and sisterhood of female dancers, illustrating the evolution of movement and freedom in traditional ballet roles.



# The arts are for everyone

*Don't let cost prevent your students from attending HOT Season for Young People performances. TPAC can help.*

**Ticket Subsidies** - TPAC covers a large percentage of performance costs to keep ticket prices low, but we know that even an \$8 ticket can be a challenge for schools. When requested in advance, we can make further ticket subsidies available to schools in need of funding assistance. Reserve a performance, and submit your subsidy request in writing, including your school's economically disadvantaged percentage number. Requests must be sent to TPAC for approval before the final attendance count and payment are due 45 days prior to the show opening.

**Travel Grants** - TPAC makes it easy to bring students into our performance halls, but we understand that the cost of transportation is demanding. We invite schools to apply for assistance with their travel costs by completing our Travel Grant Application at [TPAC.ORG/HOTforms](http://TPAC.ORG/HOTforms). Schools pay for their transportation to TPAC; grant awards reimburse 50% of that expenditure. Funds will be distributed after required documentation is submitted to TPAC. Travel grant forms and receipts for all shows in the 2019-20 HOT Season for Young People are due by May 8, 2020.

## STEP 1

### LEARN ABOUT OUR PERFORMANCES.

Visit our website, [TPAC.ORG/HOT](http://TPAC.ORG/HOT), to find out more about our shows, including teacher guidebooks with lesson ideas and performance information. Discover show enhancements such as HOT Teacher Workshops, ArtSmart Study Units, or post-show TalkBacks with performers. Our website also contains day-of-show instructions, policies, and useful videos.

## STEP 2

### REQUEST A PERFORMANCE DATE.

Each school reservation must be made by one contact person. As the reservation contact person, you will fill out the online request form on our website at [TPAC.ORG/HOTreservations](http://TPAC.ORG/HOTreservations) or call the HOT Reservations Line at 615-687-4288.

Once your reservation request is received, TPAC staff will contact you to complete your request by matching the performance date options with your school availability. Tickets are not reserved until you have received a confirmation email from TPAC.

## STEP 3

### CONFIRM YOUR RESERVATION.

As the reservation contact person, you will receive a confirmation email and an invoice email from TPAC staff. If you have not received both of these emails within 24 hours of completing your request with TPAC staff, check your email folders to make sure we are on your accepted email list. If you do not find the confirmation email and invoice there, contact the HOT Reservations Line at 615-687-4288.

#### ***Confirmation Email***

The confirmation email will include the confirmed performance date, time, number of tickets, and estimated payment due for the field trip. Ensure that the reservation date and the ticket count match your records. A copy of our policies and procedures will be attached to the confirmation. Please read our policies and procedures and contact TPAC staff with any questions. The reservation contact person is responsible for meeting all reservation deadlines and payment policies as stated in the confirmation email. The reservation contact may request changes to the reservation until 45 days prior to the show opening.

#### ***Invoice for Payment***

The reservation contact person will receive an email invoice, which will include payment deadlines and information on how to remit payment. In addition, a hard copy of the invoice will be mailed to your school's bookkeeper. The reservation contact may request changes to the reservation until 45 days prior to the show opening.

## STEP 4

### SECURE SCHOOL PERMISSION AND TRANSPORTATION.

Submit all school paperwork for transportation and payment prior to the cancellation deadline to avoid cancellation charges. Deadlines are 45 days prior to the show opening.

Ticket subsidies are available to schools in need of funding assistance. Submit your request in writing through email and include your school's economically disadvantaged percentage. Ticket subsidy requests must be approved in advance of the final attendance count and payment deadline 45 days prior to the show opening.

## STEP 5

### SUBMIT FINAL ATTENDANCE AND PAYMENT.

45 days prior to the performance opening you must submit the final attendance count, a parent chaperone list, and full payment. Reservation numbers and payment due will not be changed after this deadline.

If your school policy does not allow you to remit full payment 45 days in advance, you will still need to submit your final attendance count and a copy of your Purchase Order for the full amount due. Again, reservation numbers and payment due will not be changed after this deadline.

Reservations which consist of fully subsidized tickets are required to submit a final attendance count and parent chaperone list 45 days prior to the performance opening. Reservations dropping more than 20 tickets or canceling all tickets after the 45-day deadline will result in a \$200 ticketing fee.

**ALL CANCELLATIONS MUST OCCUR BEFORE THE 45-DAY DEADLINE AND MUST BE SUBMITTED IN WRITING.**

## STEP 6

### ATTEND YOUR FIELD TRIP!

As the reservation contact person, you will receive a show reminder the week before the trip to TPAC. This reminder email will include information about arrival, links to bus signs, theater etiquette reminders, and TalkBack opportunities. ## STEP 7

### GIVE US FEEDBACK.

Complete our post show survey and help us continue to improve our program. Two weeks after the show closes, all survey respondents will be entered in quarterly drawings to win a travel reimbursement of up to \$500 towards your travel costs to the performance!
